The library will be hosting a ONE hour workshop on Noodletools after school on Tuesday, November 27. Noodletools has “Integrated tools for note-taking, outlining, citation, document archiving/annotation, and collaborative research and writing.” This workshop is fine for those who are new to the program—or beginning users. Their site was overhauled over the summer and added a book lookup feature and the ability to switch styles (MLA-APA) and source information (database-website) on the fly! The goal is to have everyone create an account, cite a few sources, make a few notecards, and an outline. We can share our work electronically when done (just like the students can do with you and each other!).

and simply select that you'd like to search for materials by common core (you can also search for state/organization content).



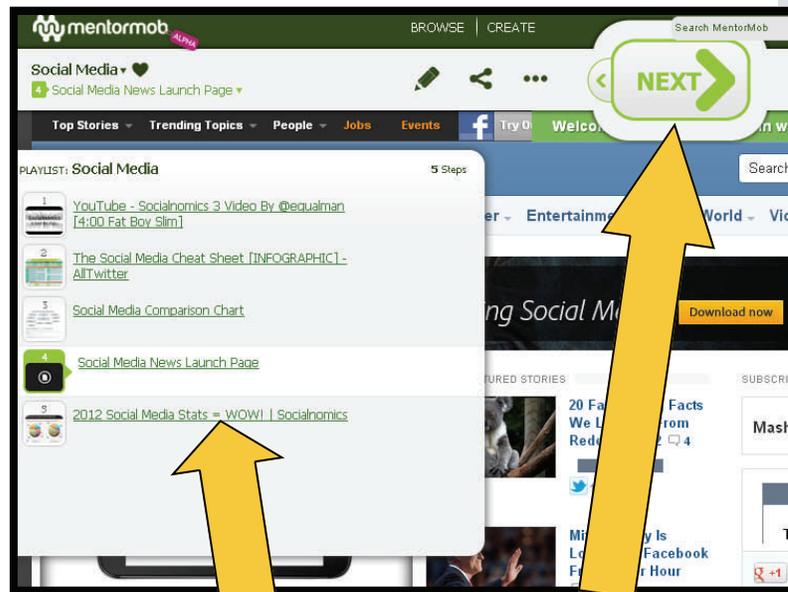

MentorMob (www.mentormob.com)



Mentor Mob allows you to make a playlist for learning. Rather than a traditional pathfinder (a list of links), mentormob allows you to string websites of differing kinds together. Students start at the top and make their way through all of the sites—in the order in which you placed them. You can include videos or traditional online websites.

The site is free to use. You can upload your own playlist or search through the ones others have made. Each playlist has its own web address. Simply give that one address to your class and they



will see all of the websites you have selected for them. Users navigate using the popout menu from the left or the Next button at the top.
